A.2. Short Biography

Jeffrey Koplan is the Vice President for Global Health at Emory. In 2006, he founded the Emory Global Health Institute (EGHI) and served as director until 2013. He is also the co-founder of the International Association of National Public Health Institutes (IANPHI) and principal investigator of the Global Health Institute-Child Health and Mortality Prevention Surveillance (CHAMPS) network.

Koplan's career in public health has spanned over 40 years, including serving as director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) from 1998-2002. He joined Emory in 2002 as Vice President for Academic Health Affairs of the Woodruff Health Science Center. His work has included assignments in Bangladesh, India and Trinidad and Tobago, as well as extensive collaboration with China. He has worked on the full spectrum of global health issues, including: infectious, non-communicable, environmental and occupational, child health, health services research and health sciences education.

He is a member of the National Academy of Medicine (NAM/IOM), a Master of the American College of Physicians and has been awarded several honorary degrees, the Friendship Award of the People's Republic of China and Honorary Advisor #001 of the China CDC. He has authored over 240 scientific publications.

Koplan is a trustee of the China Medical Board, The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and the Marcus Foundation. He chairs the Visiting Committee of the Harvard Board of Overseers to the Harvard-Chan School of Public Health.
